A seven-line, one stanza poem

Syllable count: 2-4-6-8-6-4-2

Non-rhyming



Le Sizain Hétérométrique

A six-line, one-stanza form

Follows the following pattern:

Rhyme scheme: aabccb

Syllable count: 7-3-7-3-7

A seven-line, one stanza poem

Syllable count: 3-4-3-4-7

Non-rhyming



Non-rhyming

Follows the natural speech



A question and answer poem which comes as a couplet (1st line is a question, the 2nd line is the answer to the question), but the whole poem talks about the same topic.

Syllable count: 8-12/line

Rhyme scheme: nonrhyming



A five-line stanzaic and syllabic poem.

It has climbing rhymes, meaning: the first climbing rhyme is in the 4th syllable of line one, the 3rd syllable of line two and the 2nd syllable of line three
The second climbing rhyme is in the 4th syllable of line three, the 3rd syllable of line four and the 2nd syllable of line five
The 4th and 5th lines rhyme

The first 4 lines have 4 syllables each

The last line can either have 5, 7, 9 or 11 syllables



A poem with 60 syllables, divided into three stanzas.

Each stanza has 20 syllables

Syllable count: 8/4/4/4

Rhyme scheme: aabb-ccddeeff



The Katauta

A three-line stanzaic poem

Each stanza has three lines; the first stanza asks a question while the second answers that question

Syllable count:

5-7-7

Rhyming, but the scheme is at poet's discretion



The Neuvain

A quin-quatrain one-stanza poem

The quintain follows the rhyme scheme ababa

The quatrain follows the rhyme scheme cdcd

Syllable count: 10/line



A three-line, three-stanza poem; each stanza has 24 syllables distributed among the three lines.

The poem sounds like a mantra or a prayer.

Repetition of phrases is allowed.

Non-rhyming lines except the repeated phrase.



Lune 2

A three-line poem, stanzaic poem

Words/per line: 3-5-3

Non-rhyming two stanzas



Septoplet

A 14-word poem divided into 2 stanzas (poet's choice how to divide them)

The poem pictures one image (ANY IMAGE of your choice)

A five-line, one stanza poem

Syllable count: 1-3-5-7-9

Non-rhyming

Doetic Forms

<u>Kyoka</u>

is to the senryu what tanka is to the haiku. That is, Kyoka is a five-line form of parody poetry.

While Tanka savors the nature/human nature intersection with heart and pathos, Kyoka explores just human nature, usually in as satirical a way as possible.

31 syllables, usually broken up into a 5-7-5-7-7 pattern.
